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# LETTER FROM THE CHIEF



2022 Strategic Plan

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As this year comes to a close, I wanted to take this opportunity to keep our community informed on public safety matters and discuss our achievements and challenges of 2021 and our department goals for 2022. Our overall crime rate increased by 11% compared to 2020. We saw substantial increases in violent crime, which was up 13% and homicides which increased 33%. Many of our homicides and aggravated assaults are incidents resulting from personal conflicts between known parties that result in gunfire. 62% of our homicides involve individuals who are known to each other through domestic relationships, friendships, or acquaintances. As a community we need to work towards conflict resolution without firearms or any other weapons. We seized 1,056 guns this year, but we have seen a substantial number of injuries resulting from mishandling firearms recently. We had a homicide committed by a 12-year-old who shot an 11-year-old. Of course it's concerning that a 12 year old can access a gun. As a community we must secure our weapons in a locked box or safe when not carried on our person. We have documented several incidents of weapons being stolen from vehicles. Those weapons are usually unsecured and easily available for access to criminals who may use them during criminal incidents in the future. We saw a 96% increase in our number of fatal vehicle accidents this year compared to 2020. Our pedestrian fatalities increased 33% this year compared to 2020. These are substantial increases, but the amount should be considered in context. A portion of 2020 included a lockdown which reduced the number of vehicles and pedestrians on our roadways. If our 2021 traffic numbers are compared to the prepandemic numbers of 2019 the increases are not as abnormal. For example, the difference for fatal vehicle accidents this year compared to 2019 is an increase of five fatal accidents. Despite the challenges of the pandemic, we've been able to take steps towards reducing our vehicle and pedestrian accidents and fatalities. We implemented speed zone cameras in our school zone with the highest number of recorded speeding violations. We were also approved for the HEAT grant, which is an acronym for Highway Enforcement of Aggressive Traffic, from the Georgia Office of Highway Safety to develop and implement strategies to reduce local highway crashes, injuries, and fatalities. The community can help reduce our traffic fatalities by using our crosswalks on clayton county streets and highways to cross as directed by traffic signals. When walking at night, wear light colored clothing or activate your cell phone flashlight to make yourself more visible. Also, let's avoid distracted driving as much as possible by not handling our phones or electronic devices while driving. We are feeling the effects of COVID throughout the county. I encourage everyone to get vaccinated to help manage this crisis. If you choose not to get vaccinated, please adhere to the CDC guidelines to reduce the spread of this new omicron variant. Entering into 2022, our primary goals as an agency will be to reduce overall crime with an emphasis on reducing violent crimes. We would also want to reduce our traffic fatalities and hire qualified men and women to fill our vacant police officer positions. 

### **Overview**

The Uniform Patrol Division, under the direction of the Uniform Division Commander, is the largest Division within the Police Department. There are over 200 officers assigned when fully staffed. The Uniform Division has 4 Sectors which coincide with the commission districts. These sectors each have a Sector Commander that are responsible for day-to-day operations. Uniform Patrol is known as the 'backbone' of the Police Department and the division that is most judged and visible in terms of performance.

### **Overview**

After an initial crime report is taken, there are a number of things that occur. While each case may be investigated differently the following steps may be taken:

Crime scene processing - a neighborhood canvass or interviews; interviews with witnesses or potential suspects; information may be disseminated to other area departments regarding the crime or involved parties; search warrants or other searches for evidence and/or property may occur.

Analysis – Detectives will examine the reports filed by our officers in an attempt to determine if there is a pattern.

### Overview

The Narcotics Division is responsible for the investigation and control of violations of the Georgia Controlled Substances Act and elements included under section 16-13 of the Official Code of Georgia. It is also responsible for monitoring and tracking criminal street gang activity through traditional and nontraditional enforcement activities, investigative efforts, intelligence gathering, and intervention/education efforts. It also contains the Airport Interdiction Unit, the Federal Task Force, and TIGER Unit for proactive, targeted interdiction enforcement.

The Clayton County Police Department E911 Communications Center receives and dispatches emergency and non-emergency calls for police, sheriff, fire and emergency medical services. The E911 Communications Center is staffed by state-certified communications officers who are trained to answer and process 911 and other emergency telephone calls and dispatch public safety responders using state-of-the-art communications equipment These communications officers are also trained to correspond with communication impaired callers using TDD technology. We are also able to converse with people with language barriers of all types using the AT&T language line.


### **Overview**
